LMC Meets Details

Sun 12 May – A Spring Walk in Kent – Paul Ackroyd

A delightful walk of about 8 miles through undulating woodland & fields with very little walking on roads. We will meet in the Hosey Common Car Park TN16 1PL, close to Westerham at 11.00. Parking is free. We will then walk to the National Trust property of Emmetts Gardens where the Bluebell display is normally spectacular. After a stop for coffee, we will continue via Toys Hill - this was devastated in the 1987 storm but is now regenerating - to Chartwell, the home of Sir Winston Churchill, also run by the National Trust. There may be time to visit the house & gardens: it is normally very busy so pre-booking tickets may be required. Thereafter, we can either return to the cars or continue on to the attractive village of Westerham where there are some hostelries which merit inspection.

Refreshments are available at Emmetts Garden, Chartwell & Westerham although, for flexibility & to avoid crowds, a packed lunch is recommended. The start point is not easy to reach by public transport. If you would like to come but have no access to a car, please let me know: I will probably be able to pick you up at Bromley South station. Nearer the time, please let me know if you are intending to come.

Fri 17 / Sun 19 May - Peak District - David Wells

I am organising a long-awaited return to the Peak District (for me, at least 30 years later, am sure others have visited many times since!!). The Peak District National Park offers a large range of walks, from river walks along valleys such as Dovedale, walks around reservoirs and lakes, to the high and bleak moors such as Kinder Scout, the site of the 'great trespass' in 1932 which started the move to open access and national parks... The weekend will be centred at Bradwell, which is close to Castleton and Edale, the start of the Pennine Way, and will offer walks possibly direct from the accommodation, but at most, only short drives away.

Accommodation has been booked at Ye Olde Bowling Green Inn in Bradwell, a delightful looking country pub in a small village in the centre of the park. The inn is under new management (so ignore the poor reviews which predate) and has a restaurant as well. Rooms are also available on Thursday and/or Sunday night for those who wish. I suggest those interested book directly by calling the inn (on 01433 627539) and quoting my name. First come, first served! Please let me know if you plan to come. Once the accommodation is full, there are other options available in/around Bradwell, including self catering, but likely 1-2 rooms per location - if you go for this option, please tell me where you're staying. I will plan a full day walk

for Saturday and likely a slightly shorter walk on Sunday- depending on preferences of attendees. I will book dinners later for Friday (likely at the pub) and Saturday (to be advised).

Exploring the Regent's Canal and beyond - Day Walks - Hilary Pettit

The first of Marion's Elizabeth Line walks earlier in the year was a very interesting walk along the Regent's Canal from Paddington to King's Cross and following that I have been given a book on the whole of the canal which looks worth more exploration. As these are relatively short, I have included these as mid-week walks with apologies to those who are still working.

Wednesday 29 May – King's Cross to Limehouse Basin on Regent's Canal 5.5 miles

Meet at King's Cross station at 11am outside the German Gymnasium for a walk taking in Islington, Haggerston and Mile End to Limehouse basin with plenty of transport options along the way. There is the option of a visit to the Ragged School Museum towards the end of the walk.

Wednesday 25 September – Limehouse Cut, Lea River, Hertford Union Canal loop 5.5 miles Starting and ending on the Regent's Canal, the walk will take in Three Mills and the Olympic Park before ending in Victoria Park. Thu 13 / Sun 16 June - Dolgellau - Charles Harrison

This weekend will be based in Dolgellau which allows access to areas not visited by LMC for some years: notably Cadair Idris & the Rhinogs. There are also walks along the Mawddach Estuary at both high &low level (the Mawddach Trail is along a former railway line that runs next to the river). Here we can benefit from bus services which run from Dolgellau along both the north & south sides of the estuary. There are historical sites in the vicinity: the Roman forts of Brithdir & Tomen y Mur (both on Sarn Helen, the Roman road that ran through mid-Wales); Castell y Bere built in 1221 by Llywelyn the Great; the Talyllyn Railway, Bryneglwys quarry & Abergynolwyn village - all part of the Slate Landscape of Northwest Wales, a World Heritage Site since 2021. Dolgellau has numerous places to eat &, currently, a good selection of accommodation (including the obligatory Shepherds hut!). Sun 16 / Sun 23 June – Wales Coast Path – John Blight Cardigan - Machynlleth

Following on from the epic South-West coast path journey, I'd like to start walking the Wales Coast Path this year. It's a lot longer – 870 miles – so it would take twelve years if we did a week a year. That might be a bit too ambitious so I would like to propose starting in Cardigan and working our way North up to, and including, Anglesey. That would be manageable in about four weeks. Week one will be a 72 mile stretch from Cardigan to Machynlleth, roughly 12 miles and 1900 feet of ascent per day. I've yet to work out each individual days' distances. Fascinating remnants from Kings Cross's industrial heyday - train sheds, gas holders, and other industrial edifices.

 Landmarks: Chronicling Transformation
 Notable landmarks such as the British Library that exemplify the transformation of Kings Cross.

Fri 30 August / Sun 1 September – Ben Nevis (or longer) – Marion Downie

Way back in February 2020, I advertised my plan to have a weekend in Fort William to climb Ben Nevis and then Covid intervened. 2024 seems a good time to revive the plan and although I will plan it around the weekend of Saturday 31 August/Sunday 1 September to accommodate those who want to travel by sleeper, we can also extend the time either before or after. There are many other options for good walks in the area, particularly if we have enough cars.

Travel: train from London to Fort William, including a sleeper service from Euston, or fly to Inverness and hire a car (c. 70 miles) or take a train or bus. There is also a bus from Glasgow airport. Another option is to combine the weekend with a visit to Edinburgh for a bit of the Festival or Fringe.

Ben Nevis: Walk statistics for the Ben are 11 miles, 1,345m of ascent, taking 7-9 hours by the mountain path route (both up and down).

Thu 12 / Mon 16 September – Lake District – Sarah Dixon

I have booked 2 next-door Airbnb <u>self catering cottages near Seathwaite</u>, Broughton in Furness with 4 bedrooms and 8 beds, allowing 8 people to join the meet only if 2 couples are included for the 2 king sized rooms. There are two twins, so depending on gender mix we could fit in 6 non couples with 4 people sharing the twin rooms and 2 singles. The booking can be cancelled early September if no one is interested. The cost is £1,497 i.e. if 6 people come each pays £250 or £62/night.

It's in a great location with walks to Seathwaite Tarn, Coniston Old Man, Grey Friar, Harter Fell, Crinkle Crags and even Scafell perhaps, plus the choice of the lower fells to the south. There is a pub 1 mile away. We can get online shopping delivered.

In case the meet is oversubscribed, I can look for additional accommodation or find somewhere bigger. It's good to have a flexible cancellation policy, but this location looks great. Sadly no lake to swim in though..

Meet Reports

LMC Exmoor Meet 11th - 14th April

The Exmoor meet was attended by thirteen members.

Heather and I arrived on Wednesday, 10th April; welcomed by pouring rain and strong winds. Infact the weather had been pretty atrocious for several days and everywhere looked waterlogged. The weather forecast for Thursday was not great but it looked like the Friday through Sunday, the walking days, would at least be dry.

The Simonsbath Hotel, which is owned and hosted by Andrew and his wife, Louise, was as welcoming as ever as were all the staff. Andrew's input on the Wednesday night for the planned walks was not promising! As things turned out every walk was different to that originally envisaged.

By late Thursday afternoon everyone had arrived, apart from Charles who just made dinner at 7pm — he had had a lovely day on steam trains. Getting to Simonsbath had also been made more challenging by one of the two main roads being closed. Anyway, the fire was on, drinks obtained and the first dinner consumed. I think that although the jury was still out these first few hours of great food and hospitality pointed to a very enjoyable stay.

Friday's walk was meant to be from the coast back to Simonsbath.
